







# Eligibility for State Extended Benefits (EB)

Unemployment Insurance (UI) Programs	Eligible for State EB	NOT Eligible for State EB
I am receiving regular unemployment insurance benefits in Iowa.	Yes, you are eligible for EB after exhausting regular UI and PEUC (federal extension of 13 weeks), if you meet the wage qualifications or length of employment for EB.	
I am receiving PEUC, which is the federal extension of 13 weeks.	Yes, you are eligible for EB after exhausting PEUC, if you meet the wage qualifications or length of employment for EB.	
I am a self-employed, contract, or gig-economy worker receiving PUA.		No, you are not eligible for EB.
I have previously worked for an Iowa employer covered by the Iowa Employment Security Law. I was disqualified from receiving regular state benefits and I am receiving PUA because I am unemployed due to a COVID-19 related reason.		No, you are not eligible for EB.
I am currently receiving Trade Readjustment Act (TRA) benefits due to my employer permanently closing and moving operations to another country.	Yes, you are eligible to receive EB, if you meet the wage qualifications or length of employment for EB. After exhausting your EB entitlement, you will be eligible to return to the TRA benefits that are available to you.	
I am currently receiving business closing benefits in Iowa due to my employer permanently closing.	Yes, you are eligible to receive EB if you meet the wage qualifications or length of employment for EB. After exhausting PEUC & your EB entitlement, you will be eligible to return to the business closing benefits as long as your claim year has not expired.	
I am currently receiving training extension benefits (TEB) while I attend school in a high demand occupation.	Yes, you are eligible to receive EB if you meet the wage qualifications or length of employment for EB. After exhausting PEUC & EB, you will be eligible to return to the TEB benefits as long as your claim year has not expired and you are still attending school.
